Catskills Real Estate In A Pandemic

For more than 120 years, New York Harbor has welcomed refugees. Emma Lazarus' sonnet written on a plaque on the base of the Stature of Liberty says, "Give me your tired, your poor, Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free." The same could be said by the Catskill Mountain region of New York state, which has drawn those yearning to breathe free, and those tired of the frantic pace of "the city."

Now, this region draws people for yet a different reason: those yearning to escape the confines of urban areas during the pandemic.

This is not to say that this Upstate New York area is free of the effects and risks of the worldwide pandemic, but with wide open spaces, the mountains and valleys for which the area is known, along with still-affordable real estate, the opportunity to stretch out and easily enjoy "social distancing" is a massive draw.

Local real estate agents agree that never has there been such a "rush" to escape to the Catskills (either for a second home or for a house to which they can escape on weekends or even longer stretches). And it is not just houses that offer opportunities to the escapees - vacant land, whether cleared with far-off views, or wooded parcels that offer cool shade in the summer, is selling just as well.

The Catskills may still be considered wilderness in some ways, but the demand of those living there and of those moving here means broadband is more accessible.

"High speed Internet, fiber optics, improved cell phone service - these features provide a high level of livability for both work and leisure," notes Jill Ogden, associate real estate broker with Coldwell Banker Timberland Properties in Delaware County's Delhi.

As the pandemic has forced so many businesses to close their doors and have their employees working from home, why shouldn't the home office have a view of mountains? Or lakes? Or open pastures?

And why shouldn't that home office be a large airy room in, say, an old farmhouse or hilltop cabin with cathedral ceilings? The type of home office that perhaps was once just a dream, can now be a dream come true with the affordable properties, low taxes and the necessary technology within those farmhouse or cabin walls of the Catskills.

Some folks take advantage of Airbnb and similar lodging offerings for brief stays of relaxation and "aaaah" moments. And now many are returning to meet with realtors about obtaining lodging - whether for short term or permanent stays.

"All types of real estate are selling," says Ogden. "From the most basic land parcel of perhaps five acres, to five bedroom houses to mountaintop contemporaries with numerous amenities. Even commercial properties for those looking to take the leap to beginning their own businesses are attracting buyers."

Ogden and other real estate professionals say that never in their careers have they seen such intense interest from buyers seeking property, not even right after 9/11 when there was definitely an exodus from the city.

"We are seeing bidding wars, offers made sight-unseen, bids higher than asking prices," says Ogden. As a broker known for her diligence, she strongly discourages "sight unseen" offers, especially for houses. A house can look attractive in photos, but a buyer needs to see and get the feel for the place in person. The same rings true for land parcels. Acreage that is off the beaten path and private may be isolated for some buyers who assume that most "paths" are either paved or easily traversed. Some listings note that high-clearance four-wheel-drive vehicles are highly recommended for shoppers who wish to view them safely - and buyers should take that advice seriously.

An example of a property that sold for over listing price is one in the town of Hamden, about two and a half hours from the George Washington Bridge. This three bedroom, two bath contemporary with three fireplaces on 21

acres was listed by Stephen Kaminsky, also of Coldwell Banker Timberland Properties, for \$355,000 and sold in March for \$379,250.

Other homes that recently sold above listing price in March include one in Andes that listed for \$245,000 and sold for \$275,000; one in Roxbury that listed for \$250,000 and sold for \$285,000 and one in Fleischmanns that listed for \$425,000 that sold for \$450,000.

Those high prices make the sellers happy, and those particular buyers were evidently fine with paying them. However, most house prices are considerably more affordable - being less by a hundred thousand or two than these examples - and land prices are considerably lower.

Low interest rates for mortgages are also attracting buyers. A quick look at local banks - the best source for mortgages for area properties, notes Ogden - shows rates averaging about 3.3% for a 30-year fixed mortgage rate and 2.62% for a 15-year fixed mortgage rate.

However, inventory has become dramatically lower meaning that fewer properties are available currently and it is more a sellers' market than ever. Potential sellers who have kicked around the idea of listing their properties should realize that now is the time to make that a reality. "Low inventory equals a sellers' market," says Ogden.

As for that infamous real estate mantra "location - each town has its own features that make it the town it is." Certain villages are larger with more to offer in the way of shopping and dining - take Delhi for example - which is the county seat of Delaware County. But some buyers may be looking for smaller, more intimate village centers, and a good realtor can easily identify those areas for buyers.

"Pretty much each town offers restaurants and shopping to some degree," says Ogden. The shopping opportunities run the gambit from standard daily needs such as those that can be found at a grocery or dollar store, to the more unique antiques, crafts, galleries, book stores, general store types that can be almost exclusive to certain towns. Some towns combine both.

It is not just real estate professionals who benefit from the current trend to move from the urban areas - those who are essential to such sales include attorneys, title search companies. builders, landscapers, plumbers, electricians, excavators, small businesses of all kinds - farmers' markets, etc. Of course schools figure into the picture as well. Many who decide to pull up from their urban roots to relocate in the "country" have families with school age children. Research on local schools should be done and there's an app for that, or rather, a website for that: data.nysed.gov gives K-12 information for 731 districts covering 4,421 public schools and 351 charter schools on such aspects as high school graduation rates, enrollment data, student performances, teacher data, and more.

Speaking of seeking information on an area online, it is important to find a real estate professional who is highly knowledgeable about the area. That does not point to the somewhat misunderstood Zillow website, which is actually not a site to be relied upon for actual real estate information. "Look at the fine print on that website," Ogden says. That fine print includes the disclaimer which reads: "The Zillow Companies and the Services are not intended to provide you with any financial, real estate, or related advice of any kind." The entire page of disclaimers is lengthy, to say the least. The plethora of Zillow memes that can be found online (see Funny Zillow Memes) are more fun to read than the disclaimers, such as: "I'll drink a nice glass of wine tonight for its health benefits and I'll drink the other glasses to forget I ever heard of Zillow & Trulia."

A better way to the right real estate agent would be to consult the New York State Association of Realtors. Perhaps not as entertaining, but definitely enlightening and helpful in your search.

Looking for a property with a waterfall? The infamous babbling brook? Abundant wildlife? Trails for hiking? Ponds for fishing? Friendly neighbors? Nearby cafes, restaurants with streamside dining, community theatre opportunities, countless historic sites including covered bridges and museums? A lack of light pollution which makes the night skies come alive with bright stars? These and other such features are what have attracted people to the Catskills for generations; but it has taken the pandemic to create the current exodus which shows no sign of slowing down anytime soon - except for a lack of available properties.

The Catskill region has a deep natural and human settlement history, both of which are evident across the mountains and valleys, if you just know where and how to look. Whether you are a transplant, passing through, or a longtime resident, local museums are treasure troves to be explored. Stepping into museums in the Catskills brings history alive - valuable assets to those looking to research their genealogy, historic homes or villages.

Museums are a great way to spend some family time learning about and experiencing everything from the lives of settlers to maritime history and performance instruments. Virtual learning has been challenging for many, and museums can provide reprieves by offering in-person, real life opportunities for immersive learning. Even if you're visiting from out of town you may be surprised to learn of relatives that have come before you, living and working in the Catskills.

Catskills museums offer some surprising exhibits and sites, including the oldest surviving home in Upstate New York, the oldest forest in the world, the oldest multi sided barn in New York, and the Mount Rushmore of the East. Sometimes the smallest of towns have the most intriguing history waiting to be found. The museums listed here are not the still, dusty museums of the past, but are contemporary, living sites where visitors can participate to better understand the relevance of times gone by in today's mountain valley life.

The Catskill region has not escaped the COVID-19 pandemic, so it is best to call ahead and confirm open hours prior to visiting. Some of the museums listed offer appointments. Don't forget your mask, and be sure to visit some local eateries or parks to round out your day while you make memories and in these mountains.

Delaware County

Delaware County Historical Association, 46549 State Hwy 10, Delhi | 607-746- 3849 | dcha-ny.org

The Delaware County Historical Association is located in the county seat -Delhi - just a couple of miles outside of the village. Founded in 1945, DCHA preserves and presents the rich history of the county. Exhibits are housed in historic buildings of the Frisbee farm first settled in 1797, including the original farmhouse, outbuildings and cemetery. Alongside these living, architecturally rich structures are other eighteenth-century buildings that have been moved to the location, including a blacksmith shop, one-room schoolhouse, gun shop, and turnpike tollgate house.

An extensive research library and archives offer valuable information for those looking to research their family ties in the county or historical events in the region, such as the Revolutionary War. When you need a break from researching, onsite nature trails offer meanders for absorbing and considering the rich history you have just uncovered.

Franklin Railroad and Community Museum, 572 Main Street, Franklin | 607-829-2692 | franklinrrcommmuseum. wixsite.com/museum

Located in the Franklin Historic District, the Franklin Railroad and Community Museum is tucked just off of Main Street behind the Village Court and Community Farmhouse. Now offering two expansive buildings full of exhibits, the museum's most unique experience is the opportunity to board and walk through an authentic 1889 train car. Railroads played a critical role in the history of the Catskills, connecting villages to each other and the wider world of Binghamton, New York City, and beyond. In addition to the "Warwick" train car, the museum offers a host of other railroad ephemera not to be missed, as well as an extensive model train set up that delights kids and adults alike.

Hanford Mills Museum, 51 County Hwy 12, East Meredith 607-278-5744 | hanfordmills.org

If you are looking for an interactive experience, Hanford Mills Museum is for you! As an historic working mill, the museum offers a unique opportunity to see what was once considered cutting edge, common technology in action. This community mill site has been in operation since 1846, when mills were necessities of rural agrarian life. Today the mill hosts a flurry of a somewhat different kind of activity, serving as an educational and event center preserving the rural heritage of Delaware County. The museum is an extensive site, with 15 buildings providing space for working demonstrations, a Learning Lab, special exhibits, and events.

Greene County

Bronck Museum, 90 County Route 42, Coxsackie 518-731-6490 | gchistory.org

The Bronck Museum is housed in the oldest home in Upstate New York and is headquarters of the Greene County Historical Society. The original home was built in 1663 by Swedish



immigrant Pieter Bronck and his family whose descendants owned and expanded the site until its transfer to the GCHS in 1939. Along with the 358-year-old home stands a second dwelling built in 1738, both well before the American War for Independence, as well as several historic agricultural buildings. The National Historic Landmark structures are excellent examples of rural settler dwellings of the 1700s and their accompanying barns which include the oldest multi-sided barn in New York.

Piano Performance Museum, Doctorow Center for the Arts, Route 23A, Village of Hunter 518-263-2036 | catskillmtn.org

A destination unlike any other in the United States, the Catskill Mountain Foundation's Piano Performance Museum offers a unique glimpse into the development of pianos in Europe and America over the past four centuries. The collection includes early and modern keyboard instruments and shows the development of the instrument from the small pianoforte to the modern piano. The museum celebrates the world of the piano allowing music lovers of all genres to appreciate the evolution of the ever essential piano and accompanying exhibits of tuning tools and repair kits. In addition to the style and technical components of the instrument, the museum celebrates the musicians and composers that have made pianos iconic European and American instruments for people living across the spectrum of life.

Zadock Pratt Museum, 14540 Main St., Prattsville | 518-299-3395 | zadockprattmuseum.org

The Zadock Pratt Museum preserves and celebrates the history of Zadock Pratt Jr., his family, and their interesting 1900s lives. As a tanner, banker, soldier, and member of the United States House of Representatives, Pratt's legacy lives on through the museum exhibits and Pratt Rock, his very own memorial carved into a rock face in Pratt Rock Park a short jaunt down Main Street from the museum. Pratt Rock has been called the "Mount Rushmore of the East" and is not to be missed. Whether you are interested in industry, military service, the United States House of Representatives, or gardens and nature, there is something of interest to be found at the Zadock Pratt Museum.

Schoharie County

Gilboa Museum and Juried History Center, 122 Stryker Road, Gilboa | 607-588-6894 | gilboafossils.org

The Gilboa Museum is dedicated to protecting the heritage of Gilboa and the cultural treasure of the Devonian Period Gilboa Fossils. Gilboa is home to the oldest forest on earth, fossilized and discovered at the nearby Gilboa Dam site. The museum has recently opened the new Juried History Center,

doubling their exhibition space at the museum which was also expanded by the opening of the John and Anna Juried Memorial Barn. While the fossils and geological history are the primary draws of the museum, antique agricultural equipment and a variety of exhibits provide a picture of a more recent, yet historical time. This museum is a must-see for those interested in geology, ecology, evolution and the Gilboa area.

1743 Palantine House, 102 Warner Hill Road, Schoharie 518-295-7505 | schany.org/ palatinehouseplanvisit.html

Visit the oldest building in Schoharie County. The building was built in 1743 as a parsonage for Lutheran minister Peter Nicholas Sommer. The house served as the minister's residence and church until the church was built in 1750. The living history museum offers live demonstrations and exhibits of Colonial times. There is also a walking tour of a certified nature garden and a cemetery that dates back to the earliest settlers. Feel free to bring a picnic and enjoy the peaceful setting. Open Saturdays and Sundays noon to 4 p.m.

Iroquois Indian Museum, 324 Caverns Road, Howes Cave 518-295-7192 | theoldstonefort.org

The museum, located on Caverns Road in Howes Cave, is modeled after an Iroquois Long House. The museum celebrates the history and present day Iroquois, and confronts controversial issues facing the Iroquois and all Native American culture in today's society. This year's exhibit is Identity/ Identify, which presents artistic responses from across Iroquois country that speak to who is considered Haudenosaunee and what constitutes membership. Identity/Identify explores how these definitions and designations determine access to tribal and federal resources, rights, residency options, and other components of cultural and community participation. Open Tuesday-Sunday.

If you have any interest in fishing or the natural environment of the Catskills, the Catskill Fly Fishing Museum and grounds provide a full day's worth of activities. The award-winning museum is host to interesting exhibits and programs, while the grounds provide fishing, picnicking and walking opportunities.
